## You've Got a Friend in Me

### A Friend in Need



#### Plot and Ideas

The narrative attempts to engage the reader but is not wholly successful (“One time my friend Sanaa helped me when I needed it”). The setting, characters, and narrator are introduced, but can be inconsistent (“I asked my older brother for help” and “Just then, I text my best friend Sanaa. She gets good grades in Math”).



#### Development and Elaboration

The narrator starts to use narrative techniques, such as dialogue and description (“Your my best friend” and “I think I finally get it now”) but does not fully develop them throughout. Better descriptions of the events could enhance the clarity of narrative.



#### Organization and Sequencing

Although some transitions are used (“one time” and “the end result”), they do not accurately show sequence of events in this narrative. The writer starts to work on organization (multiple paragraphs and dialogue), but it is not sufficient to move the reader effectively from one event to the next.



#### Language and Style

Sentences are clear but simple (“I had a big Math test coming up” and “He’s rude sometimes”). The use of more descriptive words and character emotions would enhance the meaning of this narrative.



#### Using Exemplars in Your Lessons

Exemplar essays are tools to take abstract descriptions and make them more concrete for students. One way to use them is to print the clean copies of the essays and allow students to use the rubric to make notes or even find examples of important elements of an essay - thesis statements, introductions, evidence, conclusions, transitions, etc. Teachers can also use exemplars to illustrate what each score point within a trait ‘looks like’ in an authentic student essay.
